Action Item: Save Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI) from Gov. Youngkin!

Gov. Youngkin continues to work on gutting the Regional Greenhouse Gas



Initiative (RGGI), a crucial and highly popular multi-state cooperative effort to rein in greenhouse gasses. He couldn't get the General Assembly to change the law that brought Virginia into RGGI, so now he's trying to use changes to administrative regulations to get what he wants.

We need to stand up for RGGI! Between now and the end of March, please post a comment opposing the governor's actions on the State's feedback portal.

Some background information:

"...RGGI is one of Virginia's top global warming solutions and is currently under attack. We need you to show your support for RGGI and protect this critical program." *Environment Virginia*, 3/15/23

"Gov. Glenn Youngkin wants to remove Virginia from the initiative, also known as RGGI — pronounced "Reggie" — a consortium of 12 East Coast states where energy producers trade emission reductions for credits, or buy credits to emit carbon dioxide past the capped amount." *Richmond Times-Dispatch*, 3/16/23

"At a press conference organized by the League of Conservation Voters

Thursday, William and Mary student Philip Ignatoff touted the benefits of the funding RGGI participation is generating and argued Virginia should lower energy bills through electricity rate reform." *Virginia Mercury, 3/16/23*

The Cville Dems will definitely be sponsoring one or more candidate forums, probably in coordination with the Albemarle Dems; we'll announce details as soon as they're worked out.


We're also wondering if people (you!?) would find it helpful for us to

Election Time = Voter Registration Time

Suzanne Michels and Jim Nix have identified all the ways you can register to vote and some important information about registering/voting this year:



- Now through 5/30 at your Registrar's Office, or online, or at a registration drive
- When you early vote at your Registrar's Office, 5/31-6/17 (same-day registration)
- On Election Day 6/20 at your local precinct (when you use same-day registration at *your* precinct, you vote with a provisional ballot which will be counted unless there's some other problem).

And as for actually voting:

- Early voting for the Primary is done 5/5-6/17 at the Registrars' Office (Monday-Fridays, *and* there will be some Saturday times announced too).
- On (Primary) Election Day, 6/20, go to your local precinct polling place any time from 6am-7pm.

Important:

- City Council approved some changes to precinct boundaries and changed a few polling places. Once these changes take effect on April 7, the Registrar will start sending letters to the 40% of Charlottesville voters who will have new voting locations starting with the June 20 primary.
- Whenever you cast your ballot, bring an ID that meets Virginia's criteria (see lists in English, Spanish, Korean, and Vietnamese)!
- For more information, call the City of Charlottesville Registrar at 434-970-3250 (unless you're one of our Albemarle friends, in which case call the County Registrar at 434-972-4173).

NOTE: Our mighty and always-active Voter Registration Team welcomes new members. It's fun to be out talking to people in the

Getting Ready for UVA/Bert Ellis Shenanigans

Bert Ellis, long-time reactionary and new UVA Board of Visitors member, has already telegraphed his intention to shake things up at UVA even if he's restrained from cutting down First Amendment-protected student political speech he doesn't like on Grounds.

The Washington Post profiled him as "controversial board newcomer who has voiced skepticism of diversity, equity and inclusion initiatives, been protective of the legacy of Jefferson and advocated for a new course for the flagship university. They also underscore mounting political tensions throughout public higher education as Republican governors and their appointees challenge university culture, norms and operations."

We're thinking it might be good to identify some Dems in advance as a quick reaction group that would be ready if/when Ellis and others in his Gov. Youngkin-appointed cohort try to push through changes that threaten academic and/or personal freedom at UVA. We'd coordinate with the UVA Dems on this. Note that there may be pressure from the UVA Administration on faculty and students *not* to speak publicly about Ellis or other Board of Visitor actions.

Volunteer Profile: Deborah Arenstein

Deborah Arenstein is new to the Cville Dems, joining our Communications Team last month, but she's been active in the Virginia nonprofit scene for several decades as a Development and Fundraising professional. She spent her early years in Petersburg and then Richmond, graduated from VCU with a

BFA in Theater, spent time in NYC pursuing acting, and then returned to Virginia and landed in the nonprofit world. Her formative development job was at the Virginia League for Planned Parenthood (this was in the days when abortion clinics were being bombed) followed by the YWCA of Richmond, raising funds for their domestic violence and sexual assault services, and their preschool for homeless children.

She took a break from the nonprofit world when she moved her family to Free Union in 2006 to live on a small farm; most of her time was spent herding children, chickens and goats. In 2008, she joined the Board of the Free Union Country School, completed the CNE Board Academy program in 2015, and joined the Live Arts Board (2016-2022) as well as performing in a few plays there!

Moving to the City of Charlottesville (Walker precinct) provided opportunities for her to use her nonprofit experience to support a number of local nonprofits in the areas of fundraising, strategic planning, and governance. She and partner Larry Goldstein, the Board Whisperers, continue to offer these services to community groups.

In December 2020, she joined Blue Ridge Abortion Fund as their first Director of Development, and we worked with her there on three 2022 events (May protest when the draft SCOTUS opinion to overturn Roe v Wade was leaked, June online panel on the likely impacts of the overturn, and the September Dahlia Lithwick/Amy Woolard talk).

In addition to her Board Whisperers work, Deborah's currently working part-time with LEAP (Local Energy Alliance Program), consulting with groups who are fighting the Mountain Valley Pipeline, and helping as an occasional poll worker at Walker.

The overt Democratic/Republican divide on the abortion issue, and our local party's work with BRAF, led her to think about participating in party politics. She cares deeply about abortion access, racial and environmental justice, and supporting families of all kinds, so feels deeply aligned with inclusive Dems who care about the health and dignity of *everyone* in the community, vs. Republican-style "angry bumper sticker" demagoguery.

So... here she is! Deborah is very interested in working with us on organizational issues, looking for community-centric approaches to "expand the tent" and share power more broadly.

Now that her two children are off flexing their liberal progressive muscles at college, she has a bit more time for interests like performing improv theater, kickboxing, and gardening.

PS— If you've done a double take on her photo and maybe feel like you recognize her from somewhere... yes indeed, that was her playing a drug addict in Spike Lee's 1991 movie "Jungle Fever" (mystery solved!).

"Sanofi announces the out-of-pocket cost of insulin will be capped at \$35, becoming the last of the three major drugmakers to cut prices....[Pres. Biden's] Inflation Reduction Act capped out-of-pocket insulin costs for seniors on Medicare at \$35 per month, but did not offer relief to those younger than 65 who rely on the drug...a new Medicaid rebate policy is a driving force behind the cuts. Starting in 2024, the rule will penalize drugmakers that raise the price of their drugs faster than the rate of inflation." *NBC News*, 3/16/23

Gov. Youngkin comes up with a murky new (voucher-lite) \$30M education program:

"To Schuyler VanValkenburg, a Democratic delegate from Henrico County running for the Virginia Senate who is among the few teachers in the General Assembly, these grants are, in effect, vouchers — public funds financing private education; in this instance, tutoring for students from comparatively affluent families." *Richmond Times-Dispatch*, 3/15/23
